### ARMSTRONG TRAIL

The 39-mile Armstrong Trail is the land-based companion to the Middle Allegheny River Water Trail. The Armstrong Trail is located on the former Allegheny Valley Railroad trail along the eastern bank of the Allegheny River in Armstrong and Clinton Counties. The Armstrong Trail links such towns as Ford City, Ranshaw and East Brady, and is a great place to bicycle, walk, jog and cross country ski in a safe, relaxing environment. Thirty miles of the trail, from Roseton to East Brady, is improved with several short, share-the-road sections. The trail is for non-motorized use only.

### VALUING OUR NATURAL RESOURCES

Our trails reflect the unique features and natural, cultural and historical characteristics of Armstrong County. The land-based and water trails encourage low-impact use and promote responsible stewardship. Please enjoy and respect the valuable resources of the Allegheny River Watershed.

### PENNSYLVANIA BOATING REGULATIONS

- A U.S. Coast Guard-approved wearable personal flotation device (PFD or life jacket) is required for each person on board. In addition, one throwable device (seat cushion or ring buoy) is required on boats 16 feet in length or longer. Canoes and kayaks, regardless of length, are not required to carry a throwable device.
- From November 1 through April 30, boaters must wear a life jacket on boats less than 16 feet in length or any canoe or kayak during these cold weather months.
- Life jackets must be the appropriate size for the person intended and must be in good, serviceable condition.
- Life jackets must be worn by all children 12 years old and younger on all boats 20 feet or less in length while under way, and on all canoes and kayaks. Others are strongly encouraged to wear a PFD at all times on the water.
- All boats must display an anchor light (a white light visible 360 degrees) when at anchor between sunset and sunrise.
- Boats can use a lantern or oil-on-battery-powered unit to meet this requirement.
- Unpowered boats must carry a white light, either hand held or mounted, to be displayed in time to avoid a collision between sunset and sunrise and during restricted visibility.
- All powered boats must show running lights between sunset and sunrise. All boats are required to carry a sound-producing device.
- Motorboats less than 40 feet in length must carry some mechanical means of making a sound signal. This device may be hand-, mouth- or power-operated. An athletic coach's whistle is an acceptable device.
- Operators of unpowered boats (canoes, kayaks, rowboats) are required to carry a device capable of sounding a prolonged blast for 4-6 seconds that can be heard by another boat operator in time to avoid a collision. An athletic coach's whistle is acceptable.
- All motorboats must be registered, regardless of where they launch.
- Unpowered boats (canoes, kayaks, rowboats) using Pennsylvania Fish & Boat Commission, State Park, or State Forest access areas must either be registered OR display a valid launch permit. Launch permits can be purchased through the Commission's website at [www.fishandboat.com](http://www.fishandboat.com). Click on "Outdoor Shop" icon or at many state park offices.
- Operating watercraft, including canoes and kayaks, under the influence of alcohol or drugs is illegal. This law is strongly enforced for user safety. ### PADDLER SAFETY TIPS

- Wear your life jacket. About 80 percent of all recreational boating fatalities happen to people who are not wearing a life jacket.
- Be prepared for the weather. Get a forecast before you go... sudden winds and rain are common and can turn a pleasant trip into a risky, unpredictable venture.
- Wear wading shoes or tennis shoes with wool, polypropylene, pile or neoprene socks.
- Never take your boat over a low-head dam.
- Portage (carry) your boat around any section of water about which you feel uncertain.
- Never boat alone. Boating safety increases with numbers.
- Keep painter lines (ropes tied to the bow) and any other ropes coiled and secured.
- Never be a rope to yourself or to another paddler, especially a child.
- If in a canoe, kneel to increase stability before entering rougher water, like a rapids.
- If you come into an obstruction, lean toward it. This will usually prevent your capsizing or flooding the boat.
- File a boat plan with a reliable person, indicating where you are going and when you will return. Remember to contact the person when you have returned safely.

### HAZARDS OF PADDLING THE ALLEGHENY RIVER

The 32-mile Allegheny is a mighty and majestic river. More than 60 miles of river traverse Armstrong County. For enthusiasts, anglers and nature lovers, paddling on the Allegheny and its tributary streams is a great way to spend an hour or a day.

Nevertheless, many hazards present themselves, including river crossings, commercial traffic, wind, waves, swifter current, high water levels and tressels. The Allegheny River provides a wide range of experiences; therefore, we suggest that you complete a safety class and receive professional instruction before paddling the river. No one should attempt non-motorized boating without proper training.

### RIVER CURRENT AND WATER LEVELS

Avoid paddling at high-water conditions, which cause strong currents and force debris from banks in the river. Rainfall also increases the risk of treacherous currents and submerged debris that can cause accidents and injuries. ### WIND, WAVES & RIVER CROSSINGS

The Allegheny River is very wide, particularly in the pools above each Army Corps of Engineers dam. In most places the river is very wide. It can take considerable time and effort to cross via a paddle craft. Once out into the river, you may experience waves, choppy conditions and wind. Due to the winding nature of the river, wind direction changes often. You can minimize the wind's influence on your boat by paddling directly into the wind. Note wind icons on map for likely locations.

### COMMERCIAL TRAFFIC

The Allegheny River is classified as federal waters, and all boats must comply with the U.S. Coast Guard requirements. Commercial vessels are confined to a shipping channel. Recreational boaters must yield the right of way to commercial vessels. An important constraint is the pilot's "blind spot." The blind spot extends for hundreds of feet in front of a barge. Therefore, do not come or layback in the path of barges. Barges also have limited navigation due to their sizes and



### Locking Through in Armstrong County

#### SEASONAL ACCESS TO THE LOCKS

To avoid the river through the locks, follow the guidelines listed on the river. This is recommended for inexperienced paddlers only.

- A lock is an engineering structure that raises and lowers boats between different levels of water on a river or canal. "Locking through" is the process of crossing through the locks in the end of the river.
- When keeping downstream, the lock is critical to use, stay away from trees or rocks.
- On the river, the lock is located as far upstream as possible, just past the point where the river is visible and recognizable from others. Cross over to the correct side of the river since the lock is located as far upstream as possible before you arrive, and hug the shoreline. Keep an eye out for the "MAHONING" signs and the white and orange poles. Signs may be broken off the fleet depending on time of year.
- Let the Lock Master know you are there by ringing the bell located at the end of the dock, calling them on the phone or VHF radio channel 13, or sounding one long blast followed by one short blast. Advance communication is advised. Arms 6-2, 8 and 10 are the Allegheny River canons on armed hours. See "Seasonal Access to the Locks" on page 16.
- Approach the lock and be aware of the following signals: Red means stand clear and do not enter. Yellow means approach lock under full control. Green means proceed to enter lock directly. The Lock Master may also signal via air horn. One long blast means enter lock directly. Two long blasts means enter river lock. One short blast means leave river and back lock and two short blasts means move riverward lock.
- Cross ahead at least 75 feet of mooring line to secure your non-motorized craft safely to the lockwall. The Lock Master reserves the right to deny permission to pass through due to inadequate time. To proceed, give one end of the line to the Lock Master. He will place the line around the mooring hook above. Feed the rope through your hand going up/down with the wood end while holding the other end steady.
- After being let up/down, wait for the Lock Master to give you an all before proceeding. Leave at a slow and consistent speed, staying close yet visible beside the lock wall. Do not stop until you are well away from the pull of the craft's current and other boat traffic.

#### Lock and Dam 9 - Locks are river left at mile 62.2

The uppermost navigation dam in Armstrong County. The pool above this dam starts to effect paddling at approximately 700 feet, creating still water exposed to wind. Portage routes are not available around the dam, and the last existing opportunity to portage the river above the dam is at 68.5%. Lock operator: 724-868-2486.

#### Lock and Dam 8 - Locks are river left at mile 52.6

South of Templeton, the pool above this dam starts to effect paddling at Mile 55.5, at the mouth of Mahoning Creek. Portage routes are not available around the dam, and the last existing opportunity to portage the river above the dam is at the Templeton Fish & Boat Commission launch at 54.5%. Lock operator: 724-868-3120.

#### Lock and Dam 7 - Locks are river right at mile 47.7

Kittanning. The pool above this dam starts to effect paddling at Mile 40, just above the mouth of Chinkapin Creek. Portage routes are not available around the dam, and the last existing opportunity to portage the river above the dam is at the Kittanning Fish & Boat Commission launch at 40.5%. Lock operator: 724-295-3775.

#### Lock and Dam 6 - Locks are river right at mile 36.3

Above Chinkapin, the pool above this dam starts to effect paddling at Mile 41, just above the mouth of Chinkapin Creek. Portage routes are not available around the dam, and the last existing opportunity to portage the river above the dam is at the Kittanning Fish & Boat Commission launch at 40.5%. Lock operator: 724-295-3775.

#### Lock and Dam 5 - Locks are river right at mile 30.4

Frostproof. The pool above this dam starts to effect paddling at Mile 34.5, at the mouth of River Road, Clinton. Lock operator: 724-295-2265.

#### Lock and Dam 4 - Locks are river right at mile 26.3

At Roseton. The pool above this dam starts to effect paddling at Mile 27.5, just above the mouth of Roseton Creek. Lock operator: 724-783-1202.

#### Lock and Dam 3 - Locks are river right at mile 22.2

At Roseton. The pool above this dam starts to effect paddling at Mile 23.5, just above the mouth of Roseton Creek. Lock operator: 724-783-1202.

#### Lock and Dam 2 - Locks are river right at mile 18.5

At Roseton. The pool above this dam starts to effect paddling at Mile 19.5, just above the mouth of Roseton Creek. Lock operator: 724-783-1202.

#### Lock and Dam 1 - Locks are river right at mile 14.5

At Roseton. The pool above this dam starts to effect paddling at Mile 15.5, just above the mouth of Roseton Creek. Lock operator: 724-783-1202.

#### Lock and Dam 0 - Locks are river right at mile 10.5

At Roseton. The pool above this dam starts to effect paddling at Mile 11.5, just above the mouth of Roseton Creek. Lock operator: 724-783-1202.

#### Lock and Dam - Locks are river right at mile 6.5

At Roseton. The pool above this dam starts to effect paddling at Mile 7.5, just above the mouth of Roseton Creek. Lock operator: 724-783-1202.

#### Lock and Dam - Locks are river right at mile 2.5

At Roseton. The pool above this dam starts to effect paddling at Mile 3.5, just above the mouth of Roseton Creek. Lock operator: 724-783-1202.

#### Lock and Dam - Locks are river right at mile 0.5

At Roseton. The pool above this dam starts to effect paddling at Mile 0.5, just above the mouth of Roseton Creek. Lock operator: 724-783-1202.

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# Middle Allegheny River Water Trail

## ALLEGHENY RIVER ACCESS POINTS

Numerical designations indicate the mile mark above the Allegheny River's confluence with the Ohio River.

R or L designations indicate whether the stream access point is on the paddler's right or left when heading downstream.

### 29.1 R Freeport Riverfront Park

520-538 Riverside Dr., Freeport, PA 16229  
Southern terminus of Middle Allegheny Water Trail. Paved/gravel ramp. Accessible dock with accessible wooden ramp, on-street parking, proximity to downtown Freeport, picnic and restroom facilities. Take-out from Kiski River Water Trail. Put-in upstream paddle on Buffalo Creek.

### 40.2 L Rosston Fish & Boat Commission Launch

Rosston Circle, Ford City, PA 16226  
Paved ramp, parking, southern terminus of Armstrong Trail. Exit point for paddle trip down Crooked Creek or Iron Kittanning.

### 44.8 L Kittanning Fish & Boat Commission Launch

304 S. Water Street, Kittanning, PA 16201  
Paved ramp, parking, proximity to Kittanning. Located in Kittanning Riverfront Park, with picnic and restroom facilities. Put-in for paddle trip to Rosston.

### 48.6 L Cowanshannock Fish & Boat Commission Launch

503 McMellen Road, Kittanning, PA 16201  
Paved ramp, parking. Located in Bernard Snyder Park, with seasonal camping, picnic and restroom facilities. Proximity to Armstrong Trail and Cowanshannock Trail. Take-out for paddle trip on Cowanshannock Creek. Single public access point between Dams 7 and 8.

### 54.5 L Templeton Fish & Boat Commission Launch

Allegheny Avenue, Kittanning, PA 16201 (in Templeton)  
Paved ramp, parking. Access to Templeton. Proximity to Armstrong Trail. Take-out for paddle trip on Mahoning Creek or from points north on Allegheny River.

### 58.1 R Foot of Belleau Road, Adrian

Belleau Road, Adrian, PA 16220  
Gravel beach access, park off side of road. Take-out for paddle trip from Upstream on Allegheny River, or put-in for 2.6-mile paddle to Templeton (25 driving miles).

### 60.4 R Foot of Spot Road, Adrian

Spot Road / East Franklin Township Road 438, Adrian, PA 16220  
Gravel beach access, park off side of road. Put-in for paddle to Belleau Road (5.1 driving miles) or Templeton (25 driving miles).

### 68.5 L East Brady Municipal Park

300 Shady Shores Drive, East Brady, PA 16228  
Accessible walkway to riverbank and fishing pier. Parking, public restrooms, picnic area, play area, informational kiosks in municipal park. Proximity to Armstrong Trail.

### 70 R Brady Bend Fish & Boat Commission Launch

218 Seybertown Road, East Brady, PA 16228  
Paved ramp, seasonal dock, restroom, parking. Access via roadway bridge to East Brady business district. Put-in for paddle trip to East Brady Municipal Park. Take-out for paddle trip from Parker.

### 83.3 R Parker Fish & Boat Commission Launch

218 N. River Avenue, Parker, PA 16249  
Paved ramp, seasonal dock, parking. Access to Parker business district. Put-in for paddle trip to Brady Bend. Take-out for paddle trip from Emerson.

### 90 L Emerson Launch

700 River Avenue, Emeryton, PA 16373  
Northern terminus of Middle Allegheny Water Trail. Paved ramp, off-street parking, picnic area, informational kiosks. Access to Emeryton business district. Put-in for paddle trip to Parker.



## TRIBUTARY STREAM ACCESS POINTS

Numerical designations below indicate the mile mark above each stream's confluence with the Allegheny River. R or L designations indicate whether the stream access point is on the paddler's right or left when heading downstream.

### Mahoning Creek

#### 22.5 L Mahoning Creek Lake Park

Denn Site Road, New Bethlehem, PA 16242  
Pathway access to stream. Take-out at Putneyville Park or Templeton.

#### 16.6 L Putneyville Park

1050 State Rd. 102, New Bethlehem, PA 16242  
Pathway access to stream. Take-out at mouth of Mahoning or Templeton.

#### 0.1 R Mouth of the Mahoning

SP 1003, Templeton PA 16229  
Pathway access to stream. Take-out at Templeton.

### Cowanshannock Creek

#### 3.6 L Foot of Stever Road

L22 Stever Road, Kittanning, PA 16201  
Pathway access to stream. Take-out at Bernard Snyder Park.

### Crooked Creek

#### 7.0 L Crooked Creek Park Dam Launch

Kerr Road, Ford City, PA 16226  
Paved ramp, seasonal dock, gravel beach launch area, restrooms, below dam spillway. Seasonal camping in Crooked Creek Park. Take-out at Rosston Fish & Boat Commission Launch.

### Buffalo Creek

#### 0.2 R Freeport Fish & Boat Commission Launch

221 First St., Freeport, PA 16229  
Paved ramp, seasonal dock, parking. Four-block walk to Freeport Business District. Short paddle to or from Freeport Community Park.
